# July 30, 2023: Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

One of the divisions of the Hebrew Bible is the <u>Ketuvim</u>, the Writings, or otherwise called Wisdom literature. The wisdom tradition <u>is an ancient one</u>, originating in Mesopotamia, Canaan and Egypt. Ancient Egyptian wisdom <u>consisted</u> of formal instructions and lessons taught by parents and elders to children in their communities and societies.

In the ancient cultures, of which Israel is a part, wisdom was oftentimes understood as either practical or speculative. Practical wisdom dealt with everyday attitudes, beliefs, customs, manners, forms of behavior, and economic, social, and ethical issues. This kind of wisdom was passed down from generation to generation through families, clans and tribes.

Speculative wisdom was more philosophical as people tried to make sense of natural disasters, untimely deaths, the dilemma of innocent suffering, and the irony of why injustice continued to prosper. The biblical cultures maintained that wisdom could be found in daily life, in the community, in the "marketplace," in all creation. The Hebrew word for wisdom is <u>chokmah</u>, a feminine noun, and <u>sophia</u> in Greek. The question for 21st-century readers is this: Do ancient stories and poems have any wisdom for us today, or are they merely dusty relics of past times that need to be buried? This Sunday's readings from the book of Kings and the Gospel of Matthew offers some perspectives on this question.

In 1 Kings 3:5, 7-12, the contents of a dream unfolds. Significant here is the role that dreams can play in the communication between humans and the divine. In the Bible, dreams may be symbolic, associated with invitations as in the call narratives, or serve as guidance from the divine to the human. Oftentimes, intuition, the highest form of intelligence, comes into play. In today's story from the Book of Kings, God and Solomon dialogue in a dream. The all-wise one extends an invitation: "Ask something of me and I will give it to you." The self-aware, reflective young leader, realizing his own inadequacies and sensing the gifts needed for leadership, asks for an understanding heart.

In a time of political strife, with empires jockeying for positions in the global arena, Solomon asks not for an increase of power, prestige, wealth or longevity. He asks instead for an understanding heart so that he can exercise proper judgment. This deed would likely include justice tempered with compassion and empathy, three virtues essential for good governance.

In essence, Solomon is asking for wisdom, and the all-wise one bestows the gift fully and deeply. This young leader, with a lot of self-knowledge, possesses the humility to ask for the gift most needed to be of service to the people without ruling "over" them. This dialogue that we readers are privileged to share showcases the internal character of Solomon. Some today might see him as an "old soul."

# July 2023: Embracing Diversity: Celebrating the Journey of Immigration

This week's the MHR Peace and Social Justice Corner highlights an article that reflects on the tenth anniversary of Pope Francis' visit to Lampedusa, where he prayed for refugees and migrants lost at sea. The Pope's visit aimed to draw attention to the plight of migrants fleeing war, persecution, and poverty. He denounced the "globalization of indifference" and posed the ques-



tion, "Where is your brother?"— highlighting the need for solidarity and compassion.

The article notes that illegal migration through Lampedusa has remained a significant issue, with the Mediterranean Sea often referred to as the "biggest cem-

etery in Europe." The International Organization for Migration (IOM) has recorded over 17,000 deaths and missing individuals in the Central Mediterranean migration route since 2014. The number could be higher due to unaccounted shipwrecks. Despite efforts to curb migration through other routes, some migrants attempt dangerous sea crossings to reach Italy.

In response to these tragedies, Pope Francis emphasizes the complexity of the migration issue. Paolo Ruffini, the Vatican Prefect of the Dicastery for Communication, highlights the importance of listening, understanding, and managing migration rather than seeking simple solutions. Ruffini emphasizes the need to remember past events and avoid slogans, urging heartfelt dialogue and sharing to address the challenges.

It is noteworthy that attention and resources are sometimes disproportionate. The recent Titan expedition, which involved the search for five missing millionaires, received far more attention and resources compared to the hundreds who died when a boat carrying migrants sank in Greek waters. The disparity in attention and resources between high-profile events like the missing millionaires' expedition and the tragic deaths of migrants at sea serves as a reminder of the ongoing need for compassion and action in addressing the complexities of migration, while urging society to prioritize and allocate resources in a just and equitable manner.
